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

Positive parenting describes a set of parental behaviors that foster a child's capacity to **love**, **trust**, **explore and learn**. The goal of positive parenting is to help parents guide their children's healthy development in the context of the family's culture. Key elements of positive parenting include the ability to:







Recognize that parenting can be stressful and missteps are a natural part of child-rearing.



Recognize and **celebrate** the child's strengths, abilities, and capacity to learn and develop.



Provide consistent, age-appropriate guidelines and limits for child behavior.



Work toward a **balance** of meeting parental needs and child needs.



Delight in moments of connection with the child;



Recognize and regulate their own feelings and behaviors before they respond to the child.



Seek help, support or additional information on parenting when needed.

Maintain Consistent and Predictable Routines	Fosters connection and cooperation	You and Baby
Activity/Lesson Description		

Try and provide your baby a consistent routine of feeding, napping, playtime, etc. They are more relaxed when they are aware of what to expect next.

Activity #2 Title	Learning Goal/Objective	Materials
Be an Emotional Role Model	Fosters connection and cooperation, healthy relationships	You and Baby
Activity/Lesson Description		

Babies can feed off of your emotions. So if you're in a cranky mood your baby can pick up on that and become fussy. Respond calmly to good or bad situations, show kindness towards others, and be emotionally available to the baby when they need you. This encourages the baby to have healthy relationships when they grow up.

Peek-A-Boo	Building Relationships	You and Baby	
Activity/Lesson Description			

Games like Peek-A-Boo help you coo with your baby back and forth. Helping to form a relationship.

Respond to Vocalizations	Building Relationships with Adults	You and Baby

Respond when the baby is blabbering or making cooing sounds. Nod your head and reply to them like you understand what they are trying to say. They learn turn taking of conversation well before they have words

Playing with Friends	Building Relationships, learning how to interact with others, social skills	Baby and friends	
Activity/Lesson Description			

Place your baby next to another baby (they can be a safe distance apart). Once they are sitting near each other, encourage them to coo and babble to each other. You can also set toys in front of the babies as well to keep their attention.

Hand your baby a rattle or a soft ball. Then see if she/he will hand it back to you. See if you can exchange the toy a few times while doing this. This "back and forth" is practice for having a conversation.

Reading together helps your baby develop a love for reading books. Reading aloud also helps build your babies vocabulary when she/he has the chance to hear different words and sounds.

The Arts & Sensory Activities, Music & Movement

Activity #1 Title	Learning Goal/Objective	Materials
T-Rex footprint	Sensory Play	Green paint and paper

Activity/Lesson Description

Paint the bottom of your child's foot green and stamp it onto a piece of paper. Once you've done that you can paint a tail where you want the end of the T-Rex to be. After that you can paint little arms on the T-Rex too.

Activity #2 Title	Learning Goal/Objective	Materials
Dinosaur Tracks	Fine Motor	Paper, Toy Dinosaurs, and paint

Activity/Lesson Description

Put out different colors of paint, once you've done that give your child a couple of toy dinosaurs. Encourage them to put the dinosaurs feet into the paint and stamp it all over the paper.

Activity/Lesson Description

Cut out a foot shape out of the cardboard. Once you've done that, you can paint the dinosaur foot whatever color you would like. Once the paint is dry, cut two slits on each dinosaur foot for the ribbon and tie to your child's foot!



Activity #4 Title	Learning Goal/Objective	Materials
Shake, Shake, Shake	Sensory play and gross motor	Empty plastic bottles, rice, beans, sand, or anything else you can think of.
Activity/Lesson Description		

Make shakers by putting the rice (and whatever else you would like) and glue the cap to the bottle. Reinforce them by putting tape over the cap. Let your baby explore the different sounds that the shaker can make. You can sing a song while your baby shakes the bottle.

"Shake it high (hold the bottle overhead), Shake it low (hold the bottle by the feet), Shake it, shake it, Watch us go (shake it as you turn around)"

Activity #5 Title	Learning Goal/Objective	Materials
Mood Music	Sensory stimulation	Paper and Crayons

Activity/Lesson Description

Tape big pieces of paper to either the floor or the table. Place crayons out and have your child color, while listening to different kinds of music such as, jazz, hip hop, rock, and classical.

Mathematics & Science Activities

Activity #1 Title	Learning Goal/Objective	Materials
Spatial Relationships	Basic Math Concepts	You and Baby
Activity/Lesson Description		

When you're helping your child clean up, ask a question like "Can you help me put a ball in a basket?" Helping children understand the physical relationship between objects teaches them basic math skills at a young age.

Activity #2 Title	Learning Goal/Objective	Materials
Measurement	Math Concepts	You and Baby
Activity/Lesson Description		

Throughout the day, talk to your child about measurements. For example if your child takes a 4 hour nap. When they wake up, talk about how long their nap was! Another example is, if your child has just learned how to walk or can already walk, talk to them about how far they can walk. Ask them if they can walk to the front door and back. After they do this, tell them "Look how far you've walked"!

Patterns	Math Concepts	You and Baby
Activity/Lesson Description		

If you or your baby is wearing stripes, show your baby that every other stripe color is the same. So you could say "Look, your shirt has a white stripe then a red stripe and then a white stripe." Keep this going until you reach the end of the shirt.
