Single mothers, who represent 80% of single-parent households, remain powerful drivers of economic and generational mobility.

In 2025 at Jeremiah Program (JP), we deepened our commitment to improving outcomes for single mothers working to matriculate in and graduate from college — even as rising costs for housing, child care, and groceries collided with declining supports like Pell Grants and health insurance coverage.

We completed our first-ever alumni census, elevated moms’ voices in public policy, and significantly increased direct financial support to families. Your partnership made this progress possible.

89% OF ELIGIBLE JP KIDS PARTICIPATED in JP-funded summer child care and enrichment programming.



NEARLY \$100K INVESTED IN EMERGENCY FAMILY SUPPORT, helping families remain stable during crisis, including \$31K+ distributed during SNAP benefit interruptions.



196 FAMILIES SECURED STABLE, AFFORDABLE HOUSING on JP's five residential campuses, benefitting from a supportive, intentional community.



248 KIDS ACCESSED EXCEPTIONAL BIRTH-TO-5 EDUCATION through JP's CDCs, supporting early learning and parental education persistence.



\$64K+ INVESTED IN DIRECT TUITION SUPPORT, including JP's Early Childhood Education (ECE) Fellowship, which supported 21 JP teachers and moms pursuing careers in ECE.



97% OF FAMILIES who received JP-funded tutoring observed progress in their children's academic performance.

\$97K+ INVESTED IN 529 ACCOUNTS FOR JP KIDS, making them three times more likely to enroll in college and four times more likely to graduate.

\$55K IS THE MEDIAN INCOME FOR JP ALUMNI, which is 71% above the federal poverty level for a family of four.

80% OF JP ALUMNI REPORTED full-time employment, and 30% have or are pursuing additional post-secondary degrees.

900+ JP MOMS, ALUMNI, AND PARTNERS ATTENDED SUMMIT WEEKEND virtually and in person.
